- *Place an arm, finger, or leg round.*
- *Arrange or fold as a cover or protection.*
- *Cover or enclose in paper or soft material.*
- *Crash a vehicle into (a stationary object).*
- *Finish filming or recording.*
- *Arrange paper or soft material round (someone or something), typically as a covering or for warmth or protection.*
- *Cause (a word or unit of text) to be carried over to a new line automatically as the margin is reached, or to fit around embedded features such as pictures.*

- *Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering.*
- *(of a word or unit of text) be carried over automatically as the margin is reached.*
- *Arrange or or coil around.*
- *Clasp or embrace (someone).*
- *Crash into so as to coil around.*

<b>entangle</b>	Entrap. <i>Fish attempt to swim through the mesh and become <b>entangled</b>.</i>
<b>envelop</b>	(of troops) surround (an enemy force). <i>Their assignment was to <b>envelop</b> the head of the enemy column and destroy it.</i>
<b>enwrap</b>	Wrap; envelop. <i>They were <b>enwrapped</b> in conversation.</i>
<b>fold</b>	Be able to be opened out unfold. <i><b>Fold</b> up the newspaper.</i>
<b>gift-wrap</b>	Wrap (a gift) attractively.
<b>hug</b>	Congratulate or be pleased with oneself. <i>He <b>hugged</b> her close to him.</i>
<b>interlace</b>	Spin, wind, or twist together. <i>Jane <b>interlaced</b> her fingers to form a cup.</i>
<b>interlink</b>	Join or connect (two or more things) together. <i>The department's postgraduate work is closely <b>interlinked</b> with the MSc programme.</i>
<b>intertwine</b>	Make a loop in. <i><b>Intertwine</b> the ribbons.</i>
<b>interweave</b>	Interlace by or as if by weaving. <i>The rugs are made by tightly interweaving the strands.</i>
<b>muffle</b>	Deaden (a sound or noise), especially by wrapping. <i>The trade unions fear their voice within the party is being <b>muffled</b>.</i>
<b>pack</b>	Hike with a backpack. <i>The nurse <b>packed</b> gauze in the wound.</i>
<b>pack up</b>	Have the property of being packable or of compacting easily.
<b>package</b>	Put into a box. <i>Choose products which are <b>packaged</b> in recyclable materials.</i>

<b><u>parcel</u></b>	Make something into a parcel by wrapping it. <i>He <b>parcelled</b> up the goods and sent them back.</i>
<b>parcel up</b>	Make into a wrapped container.
<b>roll</b>	Take the shape of a roll or cylinder. <i>She <b>rolled</b> the ball across the floor.</i>
<b>sheathe</b>	Cover with a protective sheathing. <i><b>Sheathe</b> her face.</i>
<b>swaddle</b>	Wrap (someone, especially a baby) in garments or cloth. <i>She <b>swaddled</b> the baby tightly.</i>
<b>swathe</b>	Wrap in swaddling clothes.
<b><u>tangle</u></b>	Tangle or complicate. <i>The child <b>entangled</b> the cord.</i>
<b>tie up</b>	Connect, fasten, or put together two or more pieces.
<b>twine</b>	Spin, wind, or twist together. <i>Intert<b>wined</b> hearts.</i>
<b>twist round</b>	Twist suddenly so as to sprain.
<b><u>weave</u></b>	Sway to and fro. <i>Some thick mohairs can be difficult to <b>weave</b>.</i>

<b>enclose</b>	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>The lamp was <b>enclosed</b> in a frosted glass globe.</i>
<b>engulf</b>	Flow over or cover completely. <i>The toad can <b>engulf</b> nestling birds.</i>
<b>envelop</b>	(of troops) surround (an enemy force). <i>A figure <b>enveloped</b> in a black cloak.</i>
<b>environ</b>	Extend on all sides of simultaneously; encircle. <i>The stone circle was <b>enviored</b> by an expanse of peat soil.</i>
<b>foil</b>	Cover or back with foil. <i>The fins of a fish act as hydro<b>foils</b>.</i>
<b>gift</b>	Give something as a gift especially formally or as a donation or bequest. <i>He has a <b>gift</b> for comedy.</i>
<b>hermetically</b>	In an airtight manner. <i>A <b>hermetically</b> closed society.</i>
<b>incarcerate</b>	Imprison or confine. <i>Many are <b>incarcerated</b> for property offences.</i>
<b>packaging</b>	The presentation of a person or thing in an advantageous way. <i>His business is <b>packaging</b> for transport.</i>
<b>restrict</b>	Place under restrictions limit access to. <i>Cities can <b>restrict</b> groups of protesters from gathering on a residential street.</i>
<b>roll</b>	Move along or from side to side unsteadily or uncontrollably. <i>They <b>rolled</b> him over on to his back.</i>

<b>seal</b>	A stamp affixed to a document as to attest to its authenticity or to seal it. <i><b>Seal</b> the letter.</i>
<b>sheathe</b>	Cover with a protective sheathing. <i>Her legs were <b>sheathed</b> in black stockings.</i>
<b><u>shroud</u></b>	Form a cover like a shroud. <i>Mist <b>shrouded</b> the castle.</i>
<b><u>surround</u></b>	Surround so as to force to give up. <i>He loves to <b>surround</b> himself with family and friends.</i>
<b>swathe</b>	Wrap in swaddling clothes. <i>Vast <b>swathes</b> of countryside.</i>
<b>twine</b>	Spin, wind, or twist together. <i>The plant will <b>twine</b> round its support.</i>
<b>wind</b>	Catch the scent of get wind of. <i>The river <b>winds</b> through the hills.</i>
<b>wrapper</b>	A loose dressing gown for women. <i>Cellophane <b>wrappers</b>.</i>
<b>wrapping</b>	The covering (usually paper or cellophane) in which something is wrapped. <i>She took the cellophane <b>wrapping</b> off the box.</i>
