#### Definitions of "Writhe" as a verb

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "writhe" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Respond with great emotional or physical discomfort to (an intense or unpleasant feeling or thought.
- To move in a twisting or contorted motion, (especially when struggling.
- *Make twisting, squirming movements or contortions of the body.*





## Synonyms of "Writhe" as a verb (17 Words)

flail Move like a flail thresh about.

He escorted them **flail**ing their shoulders with his cane.

flounder Walk with great difficulty.

She is **flounder**ing in college.

jiggle Move about quickly from side to side or up and down.

The car **jiggle**d on its springs.

Push or shake (someone or something) abruptly and roughly.

The train jolted into motion.

roll Pronounce with a roll of the phoneme r.

The buffalo **roll**ed in the dust.

Wriggle or twist the body from side to side, especially as a result of

**squirm** nervousness or discomfort.

He looked uncomfortable and **squirm**ed in his chair.

Give a thrashing to beat hard.

thrash
The feverish patient thrashed around in his bed.



toss Throw or toss with a light motion.

**Toss** the pasta in the sauce.

**toss and turn** Lightly throw to see which side comes up.

Twist or pull violently or suddenly especially so as to remove something

**twist** from that to which it is attached or from where it originates.

Beetroot can be stored once the leaves have been **twist**ed off.

twist and turn Form into twists.

Use a twitch to subdue a horse.

twitch

Her lips twitched and her eyelids fluttered.

wiggle Move to and fro.

Vi **wiggle**d her toes.

worm

Treat an animal with a preparation designed to expel parasitic worms.

You **worm**ed your way into their lives.

wrestle Move or manipulate (something) with difficulty.

She **wrestle**d the keys out of the ignition.

wriggle Avoid (something) by devious means.

She **wriggle**d her bare brown toes.

### Usage Examples of "Writhe" as a verb

• He writhed in agony on the ground.

• A snake writhing its body.

• *She bit her lip, writhing in suppressed fury.* 

• The prisoner writhed in discomfort.

joggle Fasten or join with a joggle.

The lurch and joggle of the call.

The lurch and **joggle** of the car.

kink Form a curl curve or kink.

There are still a few **kink**s to iron out.

**meandering** Following a winding course.

He has a penchant for obscure verbal **meandering**s.

plait Weave into plaits.

She wore her dark hair in **plait**s.

Neither parallel nor at right angles to a specified or implied line askew

**skew** crooked.

The picture was **skew**.

Of an electronic device undergo slewing.

I was assaulted by the thump and **slew** of the van.

slug

A line of type in Linotype printing.

The reactor uses embedded **slug**s of uranium.

strife Angry or bitter disagreement over fundamental issues; conflict.

Decades of civil strife.

torsion (in a gastropod mollusc) the spontaneous twisting of the visceral hump

through 180° during larval development.

turn A place where a road meets or branches off another a turning.

They were approaching the **turn**.

tweak Improve (a mechanism or system) by making fine adjustments to it.

An affectionate **tweak**.

twist Form into twists.

With a quick **twist** of his head he surveyed the room.

wiggle A wiggling movement.

A slight **wiggle** of the hips.



Used in names of other animals that resemble worms in some way e g slow

**worm** worm shipworm.

*I* wormed my right hand between my body and the earth.

wrench Turn something especially a nut or bolt with a wrench.

**Wrench** a window off its hinges.

Obtain by seizing forcibly or violently, also metaphorically.

**wrest** They wanted people to **wrest** control of their lives from impersonal

bureaucracies.

wrestle Struggle with a difficulty or problem.

*She* **wrestle**d the keys out of the ignition.

The sport or activity of grappling with an opponent and trying to throw or

wrestling hold them down on the ground, typically according to a code of rules.

We watched his grappling and **wrestling** with the bully.

wriggle A wriggling movement.

She **wriggle**d her bare brown toes.

wry Bent to one side.

With a **wry** Scottish wit.
