## Wrongly as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Wrongly" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “wrongly” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In an inaccurate manner.*
- *Without justice or fairness- Shakespeare.*
- *In an unjust, dishonest, or immoral way.*
- *In a way that is incorrect or mistaken.*

### Synonyms of "Wrongly" as an adverb (2 Words)

**incorrectly** In a mistaken way; wrongly.  
*She was **incorrectly** identified in a photo.*

**wrong** With an incorrect result.  
*What am I doing **wrong**.*

### Usage Examples of "Wrongly" as an adverb

- *One who admitted acting wrongly was subsequently fired.*
- *Wrongly interpreted results.*
- *My name is spelled wrongly.*
- *Henry wrongly claimed £39,000 of taxpayers' money.*

| <b>fallacious</b>     | Intended to deceive.<br><i><b>Fallacious</b> arguments.</i>  |
| <b>faulty</b>         | Having or displaying weaknesses.<br><i><b>Faulty</b> logic.</i>  |
| <b>flaw</b>           | Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective.<br><i>The computer game was <b>flawed</b> by poor programming.</i>   |
| <b>flawed</b>         | Having or characterized by a fundamental weakness or imperfection.<br><i>A <b>flawed</b> hero.</i>   |
| <b>immoral</b>        | Not conforming to accepted standards of morality.<br><i>Unseemly and <b>immoral</b> behaviour.</i>   |
| <b>imperfect</b>      | The imperfect tense.<br><i>Had only an <b>imperfect</b> understanding of his responsibilities.</i>   |
| <b>improper</b>       | Not conforming to legality, moral law, or social convention.<br><i>An <b>improper</b> suggestion.</i>  |
| <b>inaccurate</b>     | Not accurate.<br><i>False or <b>inaccurate</b> descriptions of goods.</i>  |
| <b>inappropriate</b>  | Not suitable for a particular occasion etc.<br><i>There are penalties for <b>inappropriate</b> behaviour.</i>  |

| <b><u>incorrect</u></b>      | Not in accordance with fact; wrong.<br><i>An <b>incorrect</b> transcription.</i>  |
| <b>inequitable</b>           | Unfair; unjust.<br><i><b>Inequitable</b> taxation.</i>  |
| <b>iniquitous</b>            | Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin.<br><i>An <b>iniquitous</b> tax.</i>   |
| <b>iniquity</b>              | Absence of moral or spiritual values.<br><i>A den of <b>iniquity</b>.</i>   |
| <b><u>injustice</u></b>      | An unjust act or occurrence.<br><i>She was taken aback by the <b>injustice</b> of Nora's remark.</i>  |
| <b>invidious</b>             | (of an action or situation) likely to arouse or incur resentment or anger in others.<br><i>It seems <b>invidious</b> to make special mention of one aspect of his work.</i> |
| <b>miscount</b>              | Count wrongly.<br><i>A <b>miscount</b> necessitates a recount.</i>  |
| <b>misguide</b>              | Mislead.<br><i>A long survey that can only baffle and <b>misguide</b> the general reader.</i>   |
| <b><u>misinformation</u></b> | Information that is incorrect.<br><i>Nuclear matters are often entangled in a web of secrecy and <b>misinformation</b>.</i>   |
| <b>misinterpret</b>          | Interpret (something or someone) wrongly.<br><i>Don't <b>misinterpret</b> my comments as criticism.</i>   |
| <b><u>mistaken</u></b>       | Wrong in one's opinion or judgement.<br><i>A <b>mistaken</b> belief.</i>  |
| <b>unfair</b>                | Not fair; marked by injustice or partiality or deception.<br><i>It was an <b>unfair</b> trial.</i>  |
| <b><u>unjust</u></b>         | Violating principles of justice.<br><i>An <b>unjust</b> accusation.</i>   |
