- *An extremely amusing person or thing.*
- *An organized cheer, especially one used to support a sports team.*
- *A loud, sharp cry of pain, surprise, or delight.*



Synonyms of "Yell" as a noun (27 Words)

buffoon	A rude or vulgar fool.
call	A direction in a square dance given by the caller. <i>The salesman s call on a customer.</i>
<u>cheer</u>	Cheerfulness optimism or confidence. <i>A tremendous cheer from the audience.</i>
clown	A foolish or incompetent person. <i>We need a serious government not a bunch of clowns.</i>
comedian	An actor in a comedy. <i>He s a real comedian this fellow.</i>
comic	A professional performer who tells jokes and performs comical acts. <i>The shop sold newspapers and children s comics.</i>
cry	The characteristic utterance of an animal. <i>A cry to arms.</i>

entertainer	A person, such as a singer, dancer, or comedian, whose job is to entertain others. <i>Street entertainers.</i>
hoop	Horizontal circular metal hoop supporting a net through which players try to throw the basketball. <i>A pair of plain gold hoops.</i>
hoot	A short outburst of laughter. <i>The audience broke into hoots of laughter.</i>
howl	A prolonged wailing noise such as that made by a strong wind. <i>Howls of laughter.</i>
hurrah	An utterance of the word hurrah. <i>Let s give the team a big hurrah.</i>
joker	A person who enjoys telling or playing jokes. <i>When I demanded my money he showed me the joker in the contract.</i>
laugh	The sound of laughing. <i>She gave a loud silly laugh.</i>
outcry	A strong expression of public disapproval or anger. <i>The public outcry over the bombing.</i>
roar	The sound made by a lion. <i>Her remarks brought a roar of laughter from the old man.</i>
scream	An irresistibly funny person, thing, or situation. <i>The screams of the seagulls.</i>
screech	A high-pitched noise resembling a human cry. <i>He ducked at the screechings of shells.</i>
shout	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition. <i>His words were interrupted by warning shouts.</i>
shriek	A high-pitched piercing cry or sound; a scream. <i>Shrieks of laughter.</i>
squawk	The noise of squawking. <i>She awoke to the squawk of chickens.</i>
squeal	A long, high-pitched cry or noise. <i>They drew up with a squeal of brakes.</i>
vociferation	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition.
wail	A cry of sorrow and grief. <i>The wail of an air raid siren.</i>
wit	A witty person. <i>She does not lack perception or native wit.</i>

yelp A sharp high-pitched cry (especially by a dog).
*She uttered a **yelp** as she bumped into a table.*

yowl A loud wailing cry, especially one of pain or distress.



Usage Examples of "Yell" as a noun

- *Her foot slipped and she gave a yell of fear.*
- *A yell of pain.*

Definitions of "Yell" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "yell" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Utter or declare in a very loud voice.*
- *Shout in a loud, sharp way.*
- *Utter a sudden loud cry.*



Synonyms of "Yell" as a verb (19 Words)

call	Rouse somebody from sleep with a call. <i>The driver called 999.</i>
call at the top of one's voice	Demand payment of (a loan).
call out	Order, request, or command to come.
cry	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>The cat was crying.</i>
cry out	Utter a sudden loud cry.
holler	Contact (someone). <i>I got his number so you can holler at him when you get a chance.</i>
hollo	Cry hollo.
<u>howl</u>	Make a howling sound. <i>Howl with sorrow.</i>

<u>scream</u>	Urgently and vociferously call attention to one's views or feelings, especially ones of anger or distress. <i>A shell screamed overhead.</i>
screech	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>The car drove off at speed its tyres screeching.</i>
<u>shout</u>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>Come back she shouted.</i>
shout out	Utter in a loud voice; talk in a loud voice (usually denoting characteristic manner of speaking).
shriek	Utter a shrill cry. <i>She was shrieking abuse at a taxi.</i>
squall	Blow in a squall. <i>Sarah was squalling in her crib.</i>
squawk	Utter a harsh abrupt scream. <i>He is well known for squawking about price fixing at local gas pumps.</i>
<u>squeal</u>	Make a squeal. <i>Don't you dare she squealed.</i>
wail	Utter a wail. <i>But why she ailed.</i>
yelp	Utter a yelp. <i>The puppies yelped.</i>
yowl	Cry loudly, as of animals. <i>Out in the street a cat was yowling.</i>



Usage Examples of "Yell" as a verb

- *I yelled to her from the window but she couldn't hear me.*
- *You don't have to yell-I can hear you just fine.*
- *You heard me losing my temper and yelling at her.*



Associations of "Yell" (30 Words)

- bawl** Shout loudly and without restraint.
*The manager was **bawling** instructions from the touchline.*
- bellow** Shout loudly and without restraint.
*A **bellow** of rage.*
- complain** Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness.
*Her husband began to **complain** of headaches.*
- creak** (of an object or structure, typically a wooden one) make a harsh, high-pitched sound when being moved or when pressure or weight is applied.
*The **creak** of the floorboards gave him away.*
- cry** Utter a sudden loud cry.
*This situation is **crying** for attention.*
- exclaim** Utter aloud; often with surprise, horror, or joy.
*I won he **exclaimed**.*

gripe	Secure a boat with gripes. <i>He seized me by the arms with a rude gripe.</i>
growl	The sound of growling as made by animals. <i>With a growl of fury he tightened his grip.</i>
grumble	Make a low noise. <i>The cashier grumbled about changing Swiss money.</i>
hiss	Express or utter with a hiss. <i>Tape hiss.</i>
holler	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>What was he hollering about.</i>
howl	Make a howling sound. <i>He howled in agony.</i>
howling	Filled with or characterized by howling. <i>The howling wind.</i>
loud	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>Loud thunder.</i>
loudly	Used as a direction in music to be played relatively loudly. <i>They loudly complain about the lack of jobs.</i>
outcry	A strong expression of public disapproval or anger. <i>An outcry of spontaneous passion.</i>
roar	(of a crowd) encourage (someone) to do something by loud shouts or cheering. <i>Get out of my way he roared.</i>
rumble	(especially of a large vehicle) move with a rumbling sound. <i>The five of them rumbled with the men in the other car.</i>
scream	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>The creative side of me is screaming out for attention.</i>
screech	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>The car drove off at speed its tyres screeching.</i>
shout	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>He leant out of his window and shouted abuse at them.</i>
shriek	Utter a high-pitched piercing sound or words, especially as an expression of terror, pain, or excitement. <i>The audience shrieked with laughter.</i>
snarl	An act or sound of snarling. <i>He snarled a few choice remarks at them.</i>
squawk	The noise of squawking. <i>With a startled squawk the rook flew off.</i>

- squeak** Succeed in achieving something by a very narrow margin.
*The door opened with a slight **squeak**.*
- squeal** Make a squeal.
*She feared they would victimize her for **squealing** on their pals.*
- thunder** Be the case that thunder is being heard.
***Thunder** rolled through the mountains.*
- wail** Utter a wail.
***Wail** in self pity.*
- whine** Move with a whining sound.
*The **whine** of the engine.*
- whinny** Of a horse make a whinny.
The pony whinnied and tossed his head happily.
