### Definitions of "Yell" as a noun

- *A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition.*
- *A loud utterance of emotion (especially when inarticulate).*
- *An extremely amusing person or thing.*
- *An organized cheer, especially one used to support a sports team.*
- *A loud, sharp cry of pain, surprise, or delight.*



## Synonyms of "Yell" as a noun (27 Words)

<b>buffoon</b>	A rude or vulgar fool.
<b>call</b>	A direction in a square dance given by the caller. <i>The salesman s <b>call</b> on a customer.</i>
<b><u>cheer</u></b>	Cheerfulness optimism or confidence. <i>A tremendous <b>cheer</b> from the audience.</i>
<b>clown</b>	A foolish or incompetent person. <i>We need a serious government not a bunch of <b>clowns</b>.</i>
<b>comedian</b>	An actor in a comedy. <i>He s a real <b>comedian</b> this fellow.</i>
<b>comic</b>	A professional performer who tells jokes and performs comical acts. <i>The shop sold newspapers and children s <b>comics</b>.</i>
<b>cry</b>	The characteristic utterance of an animal. <i>A <b>cry</b> to arms.</i>

<b>entertainer</b>	A person, such as a singer, dancer, or comedian, whose job is to entertain others. <i>Street <b>entertainers</b>.</i>
<b>hoop</b>	Horizontal circular metal hoop supporting a net through which players try to throw the basketball. <i>A pair of plain gold <b>hoops</b>.</i>
<b>hoot</b>	A short outburst of laughter. <i>The audience broke into <b>hoots</b> of laughter.</i>
<u><b>howl</b></u>	A prolonged wailing noise such as that made by a strong wind. <i><b>Howls</b> of laughter.</i>
<b>hurrah</b>	An utterance of the word hurrah. <i>Let s give the team a big <b>hurrah</b>.</i>
<b>joker</b>	A person who enjoys telling or playing jokes. <i>When I demanded my money he showed me the <b>joker</b> in the contract.</i>
<b>laugh</b>	The sound of laughing. <i>She gave a loud silly <b>laugh</b>.</i>
<b>outcry</b>	A strong expression of public disapproval or anger. <i>The public <b>outcry</b> over the bombing.</i>
<u><b>roar</b></u>	The sound made by a lion. <i>Her remarks brought a <b>roar</b> of laughter from the old man.</i>
<u><b>scream</b></u>	An irresistibly funny person, thing, or situation. <i>The <b>screams</b> of the seagulls.</i>
<b>screech</b>	A high-pitched noise resembling a human cry. <i>He ducked at the <b>screechings</b> of shells.</i>
<u><b>shout</b></u>	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition. <i>His words were interrupted by warning <b>shouts</b>.</i>
<b>shriek</b>	A high-pitched piercing cry or sound; a scream. <i><b>Shrieks</b> of laughter.</i>
<b>squawk</b>	The noise of squawking. <i>She awoke to the <b>squawk</b> of chickens.</i>
<u><b>squeal</b></u>	A long, high-pitched cry or noise. <i>They drew up with a <b>squeal</b> of brakes.</i>
<b>vociferation</b>	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition.
<b>wail</b>	A cry of sorrow and grief. <i>The <b>wail</b> of an air raid siren.</i>
<u><b>wit</b></u>	A witty person. <i>She does not lack perception or native <b>wit</b>.</i>

**yelp**

A sharp high-pitched cry (especially by a dog).  
*She uttered a **yelp** as she bumped into a table.*

**yowl**

A loud wailing cry, especially one of pain or distress.

### Definitions of "Yell" as a verb

- *Utter or declare in a very loud voice.*
- *Shout in a loud, sharp way.*
- *Utter a sudden loud cry.*



## Synonyms of "Yell" as a verb (19 Words)

<b>call</b>	Rouse somebody from sleep with a call. <i>The driver <b>called</b> 999.</i>
<b>call at the top of one's voice</b>	Demand payment of (a loan.
<b>call out</b>	Order, request, or command to come.
<b>cry</b>	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>The cat was <b>crying</b>.</i>
<b>cry out</b>	Utter a sudden loud cry.
<b>holler</b>	Contact (someone). <i>I got his number so you can <b>holler</b> at him when you get a chance.</i>
<b>hollo</b>	Cry hollo.
<u><a href="#">howl</a></u>	Make a howling sound. <i><b>Howl</b> with sorrow.</i>

<b><u>scream</u></b>	Urgently and vociferously call attention to one's views or feelings, especially ones of anger or distress. <i>A shell <b>screamed</b> overhead.</i>
<b>screech</b>	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>The car drove off at speed its tyres <b>screeching</b>.</i>
<b><u>shout</u></b>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>Come back she <b>shouted</b>.</i>
<b>shout out</b>	Utter in a loud voice; talk in a loud voice (usually denoting characteristic manner of speaking).
<b>shriek</b>	Utter a shrill cry. <i>She was <b>shrieking</b> abuse at a taxi.</i>
<b>squall</b>	Blow in a squall. <i>Sarah was <b>squalling</b> in her crib.</i>
<b>squawk</b>	Utter a harsh abrupt scream. <i>He is well known for <b>squawking</b> about price fixing at local gas pumps.</i>
<b><u>squeal</u></b>	Make a squeal. <i>Don't you dare she <b>squealed</b>.</i>
<b>wail</b>	Utter a wail. <i>But why she <b>wailed</b>.</i>
<b>yelp</b>	Utter a yelp. <i>The puppies <b>yelped</b>.</i>
<b>yowl</b>	Cry loudly, as of animals. <i>Out in the street a cat was <b>yowling</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Yell" as a verb

- *I yelled to her from the window but she couldn't hear me.*
- *You don't have to yell-I can hear you just fine.*
- *You heard me losing my temper and yelling at her.*



## Associations of "Yell" (30 Words)

- bawl** Shout loudly and without restraint.  
*The manager was **bawling** instructions from the touchline.*
- bellow** Shout loudly and without restraint.  
*A **bellow** of rage.*
- complain** Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness.  
*Her husband began to **complain** of headaches.*
- creak** (of an object or structure, typically a wooden one) make a harsh, high-pitched sound when being moved or when pressure or weight is applied.  
*The **creak** of the floorboards gave him away.*
- cry** Utter a sudden loud cry.  
*This situation is **crying** for attention.*
- exclaim** Utter aloud; often with surprise, horror, or joy.  
*I won he **exclaimed**.*

<b>gripe</b>	Secure a boat with gripes. <i>He seized me by the arms with a rude <b>gripe</b>.</i>
<b>growl</b>	The sound of growling as made by animals. <i>With a <b>growl</b> of fury he tightened his grip.</i>
<b>grumble</b>	Make a low noise. <i>The cashier <b>grumbled</b> about changing Swiss money.</i>
<b>hiss</b>	Express or utter with a hiss. <i>Tape <b>hiss</b>.</i>
<b>holler</b>	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>What was he <b>hollering</b> about.</i>
<b>howl</b>	Make a howling sound. <i>He <b>howled</b> in agony.</i>
<b>howling</b>	Filled with or characterized by howling. <i>The <b>howling</b> wind.</i>
<b>loud</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i><b>Loud</b> thunder.</i>
<b>loudly</b>	Used as a direction in music to be played relatively loudly. <i>They <b>loudly</b> complain about the lack of jobs.</i>
<b>outcry</b>	A strong expression of public disapproval or anger. <i>An <b>outcry</b> of spontaneous passion.</i>
<b>roar</b>	(of a crowd) encourage (someone) to do something by loud shouts or cheering. <i>Get out of my way he <b>roared</b>.</i>
<b>rumble</b>	(especially of a large vehicle) move with a rumbling sound. <i>The five of them <b>rumbled</b> with the men in the other car.</i>
<b>scream</b>	Utter a sudden loud cry. <i>The creative side of me is <b>screaming</b> out for attention.</i>
<b>screech</b>	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>The car drove off at speed its tyres <b>screeching</b>.</i>
<b>shout</b>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>He leant out of his window and <b>shouted</b> abuse at them.</i>
<b>shriek</b>	Utter a high-pitched piercing sound or words, especially as an expression of terror, pain, or excitement. <i>The audience <b>shrieked</b> with laughter.</i>
<b>snarl</b>	An act or sound of snarling. <i>He <b>snarled</b> a few choice remarks at them.</i>
<b>squawk</b>	The noise of squawking. <i>With a startled <b>squawk</b> the rook flew off.</i>

- squeak** Succeed in achieving something by a very narrow margin.  
*The door opened with a slight **squeak**.*
- squeal** Make a squeal.  
*She feared they would victimize her for **squealing** on their pals.*
- thunder** Be the case that thunder is being heard.  
***Thunder** rolled through the mountains.*
- wail** Utter a wail.  
***Wail** in self pity.*
- whine** Move with a whining sound.  
*The **whine** of the engine.*
- whinny** Of a horse make a whinny.  
*The pony whinnied and tossed his head happily.*
