scream

The **scream**s of the seagulls.

screech

A high-pitched noise resembling a human cry.

He ducked at the **screech**ings of shells.

shout

A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition. His words were interrupted by warning **shout**s.

shriek

A high-pitched piercing cry or sound; a scream.

Shrieks of laughter.

squawk

The noise of squawking.

She awoke to the **squawk** of chickens.

A long, high-pitched cry or noise.

<u>squeal</u>

They drew up with a **squeal** of brakes.

vociferation A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition.

wail

A cry of sorrow and grief.

The **wail** of an air raid siren.

wit


A witty person. She does not lack perception or native wit.



yelp

A sharp high-pitched cry (especially by a dog. She uttered a yelp as she bumped into a table.

yowl A loud wailing cry, especially one of pain or distress.

Definitions of "Yell" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "yell" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Utter or declare in a very loud voice.
- Shout in a loud, sharp way.
- Utter a sudden loud cry.

Usage Examples of "Yell" as a verb

- I yelled to her from the window but she couldn't hear me.
- You don't have to yell-I can hear you just fine.
- You heard me losing my temper and yelling at her.





Associations of "Yell" (30 Words)

Shout loudly and without restraint.

The manager was **bawl**ing instructions from the touchline.

bellow Shout loudly and without restraint.

A **bellow** of rage.

complain Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness.

Her husband began to **complain** of headaches.

(of an object or structure, typically a wooden one) make a harsh, high-pitched

creak sound when being moved or when pressure or weight is applied.

The **creak** of the floorboards gave him away.

Utter a sudden loud cry.

This situation is **cry**ing for attention.

Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. shout

He leant out of his window and **shout**ed abuse at them.

Utter a high-pitched piercing sound or words, especially as an expression of

shriek terror, pain, or excitement.

The audience **shriek**ed with laughter.

An act or sound of snarling. snarl

He **snarl**ed a few choice remarks at them.

The noise of squawking. squawk

With a startled **squawk** the rook flew off.



squeak Succeed in achieving something by a very narrow margin.

The door opened with a slight **squeak**.

Make a squeal.

She feared they would victimize her for **squeal**ing on their pals.

thunder Be the case that thunder is being heard. *Thunder* rolled through the mountains.

Utter a wail.

wail Wail in self pity.

whine Move with a whining sound. The whine of the engine.

whinny Of a horse make a whinny.

The pony whinnied and tossed his head happily.
