| <b>endorsement</b>        | A promotional statement (as found on the dust jackets of books).<br><i>The entertainer made millions from Pepsi <b>endorsements</b>.</i> |
| <b>seal of approval</b>   | A device incised to make an impression; used to secure a closing or to authenticate documents.   |
| <b>welcome</b>            | The state of being welcome.<br><i>The proposal got a warm <b>welcome</b>.</i>  |

| <b><u>accord</u></b>      | (of a concept or fact) be harmonious or consistent with.<br><i>Opposition groups refused to sign the <b>accord</b>.</i>  |
| <b><u>agree</u></b>       | Be in accord be in agreement.<br><i>White wine doesn't <b>agree</b> with me.</i>   |
| <b>allow</b>              | Allow or plan for a certain possibility concede the truth or validity of something.<br><i><b>Allow</b> for mistakes.</i> |
| <b>answer</b>             | Give the correct answer or solution to.<br><i>She rang Edward's house hoping the housekeeper would <b>answer</b>.</i>    |
| <b><u>approbation</u></b> | Official approval.<br><i>A term of <b>approbation</b>.</i>   |

| <b>assent</b>      | Official agreement or sanction.<br><i>The Maestro <b>assented</b> to the request for an encore.</i>                                     |
| <b>coincide</b>    | Go with, fall together.<br><i>On Friday afternoons we generally <b>coincided</b>.</i>   |
| <b>concur</b>      | Agree with (a decision or opinion).<br><i>We strongly <b>concur</b> with this recommendation.</i>                                       |
| <b>concurrence</b> | The temporal property of two things happening at the same time.<br><i>The number of possible <b>concurrences</b> in the diagram.</i>    |
| <b>consensus</b>   | A general agreement.<br><i>Those rights and obligations are based on an unstated <b>consensus</b>.</i>                                  |
| <b>consent</b>     | Permission for something to happen or agreement to do something.<br><i>He indicated his <b>consent</b>.</i>                             |
| <b>endorsement</b> | A signature that validates something.<br><i>The package was regarded as an <b>endorsement</b> of the government's reform programme.</i> |
| <b>goodbye</b>     | An instance of saying goodbye a parting.<br><i>We said our <b>goodbyes</b> and set off.</i>   |
| <b>greet</b>       | Express greetings upon meeting someone.<br><i>Some of the customers <b>greeted</b> the barman in Gaelic.</i>                            |
| <b>greeting</b>    | A polite word or sign of welcome or recognition.<br><i>She raised her hand in <b>greeting</b>.</i>                                      |
| <b>handshake</b>   | An act of shaking a person's hand with one's own as a greeting.   |
| <b>hello</b>       | Say or shout hello.<br><i>Every morning they exchanged polite <b>hellos</b>.</i>  |
| <b>hi</b>          | A state in the United States in the central Pacific on the Hawaiian Islands.  |
| <b>oh</b>          | A midwestern state in north central United States in the Great Lakes region.  |
| <b>ok</b>          | An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence.<br><i>Things are <b>okay</b>.</i>                         |
| <b>okay</b>        | Being satisfactory or in satisfactory condition.<br><i>Things are <b>okay</b>.</i>  |
| <b>permissible</b> | Permitted; allowed.<br><i>A kind of speculation that was <b>permissible</b> in cosmology but inadmissible in medicine.</i>              |



- permission** The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization.  
*He received **permission** to go to Brussels.*
- ratify** Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid.  
*Both countries were due to **ratify** the treaty by the end of the year.*
- sanction** Give religious sanction to such as through on oath.  
*The United States had agreed to lift economic **sanctions**.*
- welcoming** Very cordial.  
*The cast and crew were very **welcoming**.*
- wow** A joke that seems extremely funny.  
*The speaker **wowed** the audience.*
- yeah** Not only so, but.
