## Yet as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Yet" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “yet” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In spite of that; nevertheless.*
- *Within an indefinite time or at an unspecified future time.*
- *From now into the future for a specified length of time.*
- *Referring to something that will or may happen in the future.*
- *Used after a superlative.*
- *Despite anything to the contrary (usually following a concession).*
- *Despite anything to the contrary (usually preceding a concession).*
- *To a greater degree or extent; used with comparisons.*
- *As soon as the present or a specified or implied time.*
- *Up to the present time.*
- *Used in negative statement to describe a situation that has existed up to this point or up to the present time.*
- *Up until the present or a specified or implied time; by now or then.*

- *Still; even (used to emphasize increase or repetition).*



## Synonyms of "Yet" as an adverb (31 Words)

<b>additionally</b>	As an extra factor or circumstance. <i><b>Additionally</b> 50 hours of practical experience will be necessary.</i>
<b>all the same</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).
<b>as yet</b>	To the same degree (often followed by ‘as’).
<b><u>besides</u></b>	In addition. <i>I don't want to go to a restaurant <b>besides</b> we can't afford it.</i>
<b>but</b>	(used at the end of a sentence) though; however. <i>Hopes that last <b>but</b> a moment.</i>
<b>even</b>	Used as an intensive especially to indicate something unexpected. <i>He knows <b>even</b> less about it than I do.</i>
<b>even now</b>	In spite of; notwithstanding.

<b>even so</b>	To the full extent.
<b>for all that</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’.
<b><u>further</u></b>	To or at a greater extent or degree or a more advanced stage further is used more often than farther in this abstract sense. <i>Nothing could be <b>further</b> from his mind than marrying.</i>
<b>heretofore</b>	Before now. <i>Diseases that <b>heretofore</b> were usually confined to rural areas.</i>
<b>hitherto</b>	Until now or until the point in time under discussion. <i><b>Hitherto</b> part of French West Africa Benin achieved independence in 1960.</i>
<b>however</b>	To whatever extent. <i><b>However</b> you look at it you can t criticize that.</i>
<b>in addition</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in spite of that</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in time</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>just the same</b>	And nothing more.
<b><u>nevertheless</u></b>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually preceding a concession). <i>Statements which although literally true are <b>nevertheless</b> misleading.</i>
<b><u>nonetheless</u></b>	In spite of that; nevertheless. <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was <b>nonetheless</b> attended by some 6 000.</i>
<b>notwithstanding</b>	Nevertheless; in spite of this. <i>I didn't like it. <b>Notwithstanding</b>, I remained calm.</i>
<b>now</b>	In these times. <i>They should be back by <b>now</b>.</i>
<b>right now</b>	An interjection expressing agreement.
<b>so far</b>	In such a condition or manner, especially as expressed or implied.
<b>still</b>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually preceding a concession). <i>It was <b>still</b> raining.</i>
<b>thus far</b>	From that fact or reason or as a result (used to introduce a logical conclusion)thus (adv) in the way indicated; (‘thusly’ is a nonstandard variant.
<b>til now</b>	Used to preface a command or reproof or request.
<b>until now</b>	Without delay or hesitation; with no time intervening.

- up till now** Nearer to the speaker.
- up to now** Spatially or metaphorically from a lower to a higher position.
- up to the present time** To a more central or a more northerly place.
- withal** In addition; as a further factor or consideration.  
*She gave him a grateful smile but rueful **withal**.*

- *Wait, don't go yet.*
- *Aren't you ready to go yet?*
- *The rations were reduced yet again.*
- *The congress was widely acclaimed as the best yet.*
- *He longed for the flowers that were yet to show themselves.*
- *The sun isn't up yet.*
- *The largest drug bust yet.*
- *I know she's alive and I'll find her yet.*
- *I haven't told anyone else yet.*
- *I hope to continue for some time yet.*
- *Snow, snow, and yet more snow.*
- *I have yet to be convinced.*
- *Every week she gets worse, and yet it could go on for years.*
- *A yet sadder tale.*
- *Yet another diet book.*





## Associations of "Yet" (30 Words)

<b>already</b>	Prior to a specified or implied time. <i>Just stop <b>already</b> no one feels sorry for you.</i>
<b>but</b>	No more than; only. <i>As with all these proposals ifs and <b>buts</b> abound.</i>
<b>constancy</b>	The tendency for perceived objects to give rise to very similar perceptual experiences in spite of wide variations in the conditions of observation. <i>Early mariners relied on the <b>constancy</b> of the trade winds.</i>
<u><a href="#">despite</a></u>	Lack of respect accompanied by a feeling of intense dislike. <i>The <b>despite</b> done by him to the holy relics.</i>
<u><a href="#">endurance</a></u>	The power to withstand hardship or stress. <i>The annual 24 hour <b>endurance</b> race.</i>
<b>halting</b>	Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. <i>Uttered a few <b>halting</b> words of sorrow.</i>
<b>heretofore</b>	Before now. <i>Diseases that <b>heretofore</b> were usually confined to rural areas.</i>
<b>hitherto</b>	Used in negative statement to describe a situation that has existed up to this point or up to the present time. <i><b>Hitherto</b> part of French West Africa Benin achieved independence in 1960.</i>
<b>however</b>	Used to introduce a statement that contrasts with or seems to contradict something that has been said previously. <i>Although I m a little afraid <b>however</b> I d like to try it.</i>
<b>inactivity</b>	The state of being inactive. <i>People are frustrated with government <b>inactivity</b>.</i>
<b>lull</b>	Make (someone) feel deceptively secure or confident. <i>The rarity of earthquakes there has <b>lulled</b> people into a false sense of security.</i>
<u><a href="#">merely</a></u>	And nothing more. <i>Gary a silent boy <b>merely</b> nodded.</i>
<u><a href="#">nevertheless</a></u>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually preceding a concession). <i>While we disliked each other <b>nevertheless</b> we agreed.</i>
<u><a href="#">nonetheless</a></u>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually preceding a concession). <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was <b>nonetheless</b> attended by some 6 000.</i>

<b>notwithstanding</b>	Nevertheless; in spite of this. <i>I didn't like it. <b>Notwithstanding</b>, I remained calm.</i>
<b>preamble</b>	A preliminary or preparatory statement; an introduction. <i>I gave him the bad news without <b>preamble</b>.</i>
<b>preliminary</b>	A preliminary action or event. <i>Training is a necessary <b>preliminary</b> to employment.</i>
<b>preparatory</b>	Relating to education in a prep school. <i><b>Preparatory</b> schooling.</i>
<b>ready</b>	Make ready or suitable or equip in advance for a particular purpose or for some use event etc. <i><b>Ready</b> for use.</i>
<b>simply</b>	In a simple manner; without extravagance or embellishment. <i>It s <b>simply</b> beautiful.</i>
<b>static</b>	Concerned with or producing or caused by static electricity. <i>They will probably give you a lot of <b>static</b> about your editorial.</i>
<b>statics</b>	The branch of mechanics concerned with forces in equilibrium.
<b>stationary</b>	(of a planet) having no apparent motion in longitude. <i>A car collided with a <b>stationary</b> vehicle.</i>
<b>steadfast</b>	Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. <i><b>Steadfast</b> resolve.</i>
<b>still</b>	An apparatus used for the distillation of liquids consists of a vessel in which a substance is vaporized by heat and a condenser where the vapor is condensed. <i>The sheriff commanded him to stand <b>still</b> and drop the gun.</i>
<b>suffix</b>	Attach a suffix to. <i><b>Suffix</b> words.</i>
<b>though</b>	However. <i>I was hunting for work Jobs were scarce <b>though</b>.</i>
<b>tranquilize</b>	Make calm or still.
<b>unformed</b>	Not formed or organized. <i>He had an ambitious albeit <b>unformed</b> idea for a novel.</i>
<b>whatever</b>	At all; of any kind (used for emphasis). <i>We told him we d back him <b>whatever</b>.</i>
