<b>about</b>	On the move. <i><b>About</b> face.</i>
<b><a href="#">almost</a></b>	Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>The baby was <b>almost</b> asleep when the alarm sounded.</i>
<b>approximately</b>	(of quantities) imprecise but fairly close to correct. <i>A journey of <b>approximately</b> two hours.</i>
<b>around</b>	All around or on all sides. <i>Dirty clothes lying <b>around</b> or about.</i>
<b>bit</b>	The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press. <i>You could see everything All her <b>bits</b>.</i>
<b>equidistant</b>	At equal distances. <i>The line joins together all points which are <b>equidistant</b> from the two axes.</i>
<b><a href="#">fairly</a></b>	To a moderately high degree. <i>Deal <b>fairly</b> with one another.</i>
<b><a href="#">few</a></b>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by 'a'; a small but indefinite number. <i><b>Few</b> women have led troops in battle.</i>
<b>fractional</b>	Constituting or comprising a part or fraction of a possible whole or entirety. <i>There was a <b>fractional</b> hesitation before he said yes.</i>
<b><a href="#">half</a></b>	A half price fare or ticket especially for a child. <i>Gave me a <b>half</b> smile.</i>
<b>instead</b>	In place of, or as an alternative to. <i>He didn't call rather or <b>instead</b> he wrote her a letter.</i>

<b>intersect</b>	Meet at a point. <i>The area is <b>intersected</b> only by minor roads.</i>
<b>least</b>	Used in names of very small animals and plants e.g. least shrew. <i>He has the <b>least</b> talent of anyone.</i>
<b>less</b>	Comparative of little. <i>A shower uses <b>less</b> water.</i>
<b>little</b>	Informal small and of little importance. <i>He was <b>little</b> known in this country.</i>
<b>moderately</b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>Both hotels are <b>moderately</b> priced.</i>
<b>nearly</b>	Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>He <b>nearly</b> fainted.</i>
<b>overlap</b>	A part or amount which overlaps. <i>There are many <b>overlaps</b> between the approaches.</i>
<b>partially</b>	To some extent; in some degree; not wholly. <i>A <b>partially</b> open door.</i>
<b>preferably</b>	More readily or willingly. <i>He would like a place of his own <b>preferably</b> outside the town.</i>
<b>pretty</b>	Make pretty or attractive. <i>A <b>pretty</b> little girl with an engaging grin.</i>
<b>quite</b>	To the greatest extent; completely. <i>It s <b>quite</b> warm outside.</i>
<b>rather</b>	Used to express a recommended alternative, but without a than clause and used with verbs other than would; instead. <i>The knife is <b>rather</b> dull.</i>
<b>ravishing</b>	Stunningly beautiful. <i>She looked <b>ravishing</b>.</i>
<b>reasonably</b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>He began to talk calmly and <b>reasonably</b> about his future.</i>
<b>roughly</b>	With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly. <i>People were crouching over <b>roughly</b> built brick fireplaces.</i>
<b>several</b>	Of an indefinite number more than 2 or 3 but not many. <i><b>Several</b> people were injured in the accident.</i>
<b>slightly</b>	In a slim or slender manner. <i>He lowered his voice <b>slightly</b>.</i>
<b>somewhat</b>	To a moderate extent or by a moderate amount; rather. <i>His arguments were <b>somewhat</b> self contradictory.</i>
