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| about | On the move. <i>About face.</i> |
| <u>almost</u> | Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>The baby was almost asleep when the alarm sounded.</i> |
| approximately | (of quantities) imprecise but fairly close to correct. <i>A journey of approximately two hours.</i> |
| around | All around or on all sides. <i>Dirty clothes lying around or about.</i> |
| bit | The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press. <i>You could see everything All her bits.</i> |
| equidistant | At equal distances. <i>The line joins together all points which are equidistant from the two axes.</i> |
| <u>fairly</u> | To a moderately high degree. <i>Deal fairly with one another.</i> |
| <u>few</u> | A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by 'a'; a small but indefinite number. <i>Few women have led troops in battle.</i> |
| fractional | Constituting or comprising a part or fraction of a possible whole or entirety. <i>There was a fractional hesitation before he said yes.</i> |
| <u>half</u> | A half price fare or ticket especially for a child. <i>Gave me a half smile.</i> |
| instead | In place of, or as an alternative to. <i>He didn't call rather or instead he wrote her a letter.</i> |

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| intersect | Meet at a point. <i>The area is intersected only by minor roads.</i> |
| least | Used in names of very small animals and plants e.g. least shrew. <i>He has the least talent of anyone.</i> |
| less | Comparative of little. <i>A shower uses less water.</i> |
| little | Informal small and of little importance. <i>He was little known in this country.</i> |
| moderately | To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>Both hotels are moderately priced.</i> |
| nearly | Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>He nearly fainted.</i> |
| overlap | A part or amount which overlaps. <i>There are many overlaps between the approaches.</i> |
| partially | To some extent; in some degree; not wholly. <i>A partially open door.</i> |
| preferably | More readily or willingly. <i>He would like a place of his own preferably outside the town.</i> |
| pretty | Make pretty or attractive. <i>A pretty little girl with an engaging grin.</i> |
| quite | To the greatest extent; completely. <i>It s quite warm outside.</i> |
| rather | Used to express a recommended alternative, but without a than clause and used with verbs other than would; instead. <i>The knife is rather dull.</i> |
| ravishing | Stunningly beautiful. <i>She looked ravishing.</i> |
| reasonably | To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>He began to talk calmly and reasonably about his future.</i> |
| roughly | With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly. <i>People were crouching over roughly built brick fireplaces.</i> |
| several | Of an indefinite number more than 2 or 3 but not many. <i>Several people were injured in the accident.</i> |
| slightly | In a slim or slender manner. <i>He lowered his voice slightly.</i> |
| somewhat | To a moderate extent or by a moderate amount; rather. <i>His arguments were somewhat self contradictory.</i> |

thereabout Near that time or date.
*He stayed in London or **thereabouts** for several weeks.*
