gallop	Make a horse gallop. <i>He was galloping down the road.</i>
go hell for leather	Be spent.
go like lightning	Be or continue to be in a certain condition.
hare	Run quickly like a hare. <i>He hared off between the trees.</i>
hasten	Move or travel hurriedly. <i>We hastened back to Paris.</i>
hurry	Do or finish (something) quickly or too quickly. <i>We d better hurry.</i>
hurtle	Move with or as if with a rushing sound. <i>The cars hurtled by.</i>
race	Compete regularly in races as a sport or leisure activity. <i>The vet took blood samples from the horses before they raced.</i>
rattle along	Make short successive sounds.
run	Be operating running or functioning. <i>Buses run into town every half hour.</i>

scramble	Climb awkwardly, as if by scrambling. <i>McNabb scrambled in the third quarter and threw a touchdown pass to Maddox.</i>
scud	Move fast in a straight line because or as if driven by the wind. <i>Three small ships were scudding before a brisk breeze.</i>
scurry	(of a person or small animal) move hurriedly with short quick steps. <i>Pedestrians scurried for cover.</i>
scutter	(especially of a small animal) move hurriedly with short steps. <i>A little dog scattered up from the cabin.</i>
shoot	Shoot game in or on an estate cover etc. <i>Shoot a basket.</i>
spank along	Give a spanking to; subject to a spanking.

<u>speed</u>	Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit. <i>I got a ticket for speeding.</i>
<u>sprint</u>	Run at full speed over a short distance. <i>I saw Charlie sprinting through the traffic towards me.</i>
<u>stampede</u>	Run away in a stampede. <i>Companies will now stampede to release their latest software.</i>
<u>streak</u>	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>Hair that was streaked blonde.</i>
sweep	Move with sweeping effortless gliding motions. <i>They were trying to get the Lewis gun up behind some trees from where they would sweep the trench.</i>
swoop	Move with a sweep or in a swooping arc. <i>She swooped up the hen in her arms.</i>
travel rapidly	Undergo transportation as in a vehicle.
<u>whirl</u>	Cause to spin. <i>The dervishes whirl around and around without getting dizzy.</i>
whizz	Move along very quickly. <i>Whizz the mixture to a smooth paste.</i>
<u>whoosh</u>	Move with a whooshing sound. <i>A train whooshed by.</i>
wing	Shoot a bird in the wing so as to prevent flight without causing death. <i>Just jot down the title on a postcard and wing it to us.</i>
zip up	Close with a zipper.
zipper	Fasten or provide with a zipper. <i>He wore a running suit zippered up tight.</i>
<u>zoom</u>	Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. <i>You can enlarge a region of the screen by zooming in.</i>

<u>devoid</u>	Completely wanting or lacking. <i>The sentence was devoid of meaning.</i>
expired	Having come to an end or become void after passage of a period of time. <i>Caught driving with an expired license.</i>
futilely	In a futile and unproductive manner.
<u>headed</u>	(of paper) having a printed heading, typically the name and address of a person or organization. <i>Short flat headed nails.</i>
<u>invalid</u>	Disable (someone) by injury or illness. <i>An officer invalided by a chest wound.</i>
<u>lock</u>	Fasten with a lock. <i>The key turned firmly in the lock.</i>
naught	The digit 0; nought. <i>All my efforts led to naught.</i>
nihilism	The delusion that things (or everything, including the self) do not exist; a sense that everything is unreal.
nil	Non-existent. <i>They beat us three nil.</i>
<u>no</u>	Not in any degree or manner not at all. <i>He was unable to change his automatic yes to a no.</i>
<u>none</u>	Not at all or in no way. <i>It is made none the easier by the differences in approach.</i>
nothing	Not at all. <i>He looks nothing like the others.</i>
nowhere	An insignificant place. <i>A nowhere job.</i>
<u>null</u>	Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out. <i>The tumour can be more readily identified by nulling the high signal from bone marrow.</i>

sash	A band of material around the waist that strengthens a skirt or trousers.
transience	The attribute of being brief or fleeting. <i>The transience of life and happiness.</i>
uncharacteristically	In a way that is not typical of a particular person or thing. <i>He hesitated uncharacteristically.</i>
<u>vacant</u>	Void of intelligence or thought. <i>40 per cent of the offices are still vacant.</i>
value	Fix or determine the value of assign a value to. <i>The artist has used adjacent colour values as the landscape recedes.</i>
<u>zero</u>	Adjust an instrument to zero. <i>Zero the counter when the tape has rewound.</i>
zipper	Fasten or provide with a zipper. <i>Zipper bags.</i>
