<b>enthusiasm</b>	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>Her energy and <b>enthusiasm</b> for life.</i>
<b>excitement</b>	Something that arouses a feeling of excitement. <i>His face was flushed with <b>excitement</b> and his hands trembled.</i>
<b>fervour</b>	The state of being emotionally aroused and worked up. <i>He talked with all the <b>fervour</b> of a new convert.</i>
<b>goose egg</b>	A man who is a stupid incompetent fool.
<b><u>gusto</u></b>	Enjoyment and enthusiasm in doing something. <i>He had a particular <b>gusto</b> for those sort of performances.</i>
<b>joy</b>	A thing that causes joy. <i>The <b>joys</b> of country living.</i>
<b>keenness</b>	Thinness of edge or fineness of point. <i>He has expressed his <b>keenness</b> to retain his job.</i>

<b>gallop</b>	Make a horse gallop. <i>He was <b>galloping</b> down the road.</i>
<b>go hell for leather</b>	Be spent.
<b>go like lightning</b>	Be or continue to be in a certain condition.
<b>hare</b>	Run quickly like a hare. <i>He <b>hared</b> off between the trees.</i>
<b>hasten</b>	Move or travel hurriedly. <i>We <b>hastened</b> back to Paris.</i>
<b>hurry</b>	Do or finish (something) quickly or too quickly. <i>We d better <b>hurry</b>.</i>
<b>hurtle</b>	Move with or as if with a rushing sound. <i>The cars <b>hurtled</b> by.</i>
<b>race</b>	Compete regularly in races as a sport or leisure activity. <i>The vet took blood samples from the horses before they <b>raced</b>.</i>
<b>rattle along</b>	Make short successive sounds.
<b>run</b>	Be operating running or functioning. <i>Buses <b>run</b> into town every half hour.</i>
<b>rush</b>	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>He <b>rushed</b> three fraternities.</i>
<b>scramble</b>	Climb awkwardly, as if by scrambling. <i>McNabb <b>scrambled</b> in the third quarter and threw a touchdown pass to Maddox.</i>
<b>scud</b>	Move fast in a straight line because or as if driven by the wind. <i>Three small ships were <b>scudding</b> before a brisk breeze.</i>
<b>scurry</b>	(of a person or small animal) move hurriedly with short quick steps. <i>Pedestrians scurried for cover.</i>
<b>scutter</b>	(especially of a small animal) move hurriedly with short steps. <i>A little dog <b>scattered</b> up from the cabin.</i>
<b>shoot</b>	Shoot game in or on an estate cover etc. <i><b>Shoot</b> a basket.</i>
<b>spank along</b>	Give a spanking to; subject to a spanking.



<b><u>speed</u></b>	Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit. <i>I got a ticket for <b>speeding</b>.</i>
<b><u>sprint</u></b>	Run at full speed over a short distance. <i>I saw Charlie <b>sprinting</b> through the traffic towards me.</i>
<b><u>stampede</u></b>	Run away in a stampede. <i>Companies will now <b>stampede</b> to release their latest software.</i>
<b><u>streak</u></b>	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>Hair that was <b>streaked</b> blonde.</i>
<b>sweep</b>	Move with sweeping effortless gliding motions. <i>They were trying to get the Lewis gun up behind some trees from where they would <b>sweep</b> the trench.</i>
<b>swoop</b>	Move with a sweep or in a swooping arc. <i>She <b>swooped</b> up the hen in her arms.</i>
<b>travel rapidly</b>	Undergo transportation as in a vehicle.
<b><u>whirl</u></b>	Cause to spin. <i>The dervishes <b>whirl</b> around and around without getting dizzy.</i>
<b>whizz</b>	Move along very quickly. <i><b>Whizz</b> the mixture to a smooth paste.</i>
<b><u>whoosh</u></b>	Move with a whooshing sound. <i>A train <b>whooshed</b> by.</i>
<b>wing</b>	Shoot a bird in the wing so as to prevent flight without causing death. <i>Just jot down the title on a postcard and <b>wing</b> it to us.</i>

<b><u>code</u></b>	Attach a code to. <i>A revision of the penal <b>code</b>.</i>
<b>decrement</b>	A process of becoming smaller or shorter. <i>The instruction <b>decrements</b> the accumulator by one.</i>
<b>denominator</b>	A figure representing the total population in terms of which statistical values are expressed.
<b><u>devoid</u></b>	Completely wanting or lacking. <i>The sentence was <b>devoid</b> of meaning.</i>
<b>expired</b>	Having come to an end or become void after passage of a period of time. <i>Caught driving with an <b>expired</b> license.</i>
<b>futilely</b>	In a futile and unproductive manner.
<b><u>headed</u></b>	(of paper) having a printed heading, typically the name and address of a person or organization. <i>Short flat <b>headed</b> nails.</i>
<b><u>invalid</u></b>	Disable (someone) by injury or illness. <i>An officer <b>invalided</b> by a chest wound.</i>
<b><u>lock</u></b>	Fasten with a lock. <i>The key turned firmly in the <b>lock</b>.</i>
<b>naught</b>	The digit 0; nought. <i>All my efforts led to <b>naught</b>.</i>
<b>nihilism</b>	The delusion that things (or everything, including the self) do not exist; a sense that everything is unreal.
<b>nil</b>	Non-existent. <i>They beat us three <b>nil</b>.</i>
<b><u>no</u></b>	Not in any degree or manner not at all. <i>He was unable to change his automatic yes to a <b>no</b>.</i>
<b><u>none</u></b>	Not at all or in no way. <i>It is made <b>none</b> the easier by the differences in approach.</i>
<b>nothing</b>	Not at all. <i>He looks <b>nothing</b> like the others.</i>
<b>nowhere</b>	An insignificant place. <i>A <b>nowhere</b> job.</i>
<b><u>null</u></b>	Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out. <i>The tumour can be more readily identified by <b>nulling</b> the high signal from bone marrow.</i>

<b>sash</b>	A band of material around the waist that strengthens a skirt or trousers.
<b>transience</b>	The attribute of being brief or fleeting. <i>The <b>transience</b> of life and happiness.</i>
<b>uncharacteristically</b>	In a way that is not typical of a particular person or thing. <i>He hesitated <b>uncharacteristically</b>.</i>
<b><u>vacant</u></b>	Void of intelligence or thought. <i>40 per cent of the offices are still <b>vacant</b>.</i>
<b>value</b>	Fix or determine the value of assign a value to. <i>The artist has used adjacent colour <b>values</b> as the landscape recedes.</i>
<b><u>zero</u></b>	Adjust an instrument to zero. <i><b>Zero</b> the counter when the tape has rewound.</i>
<b>zipper</b>	Fasten or provide with a zipper. <i><b>Zipper</b> bags.</i>
