- *Move or travel very quickly.*
- *(of a figure or level) rise sharply.*
- *Move along very quickly.*

<b>blast</b>	Kick or strike (a ball) hard. <i>Fierce techno riffs <b>blasted</b> out from the sound system.</i>
<b><u>bolt</u></b>	Make or roll into bolts. <i>All the doors were locked and <b>bolted</b>.</i>
<b>bowl along</b>	Hurl a cricket ball from one end of the pitch towards the batsman at the other end.
<b><u>buzz</u></b>	Signal to someone with a buzzer. <i>Mosquitoes were <b>buzzing</b> all around us.</i>
<b><u>career</u></b>	Move swiftly and in an uncontrolled way. <i>The coach <b>careered</b> across the road and went through a hedge.</i>
<b><u>charge</u></b>	Energize a battery by passing a current through it in the direction opposite to discharge. <i>The speaker <b>charged</b> up the crowd with his inflammatory remarks.</i>

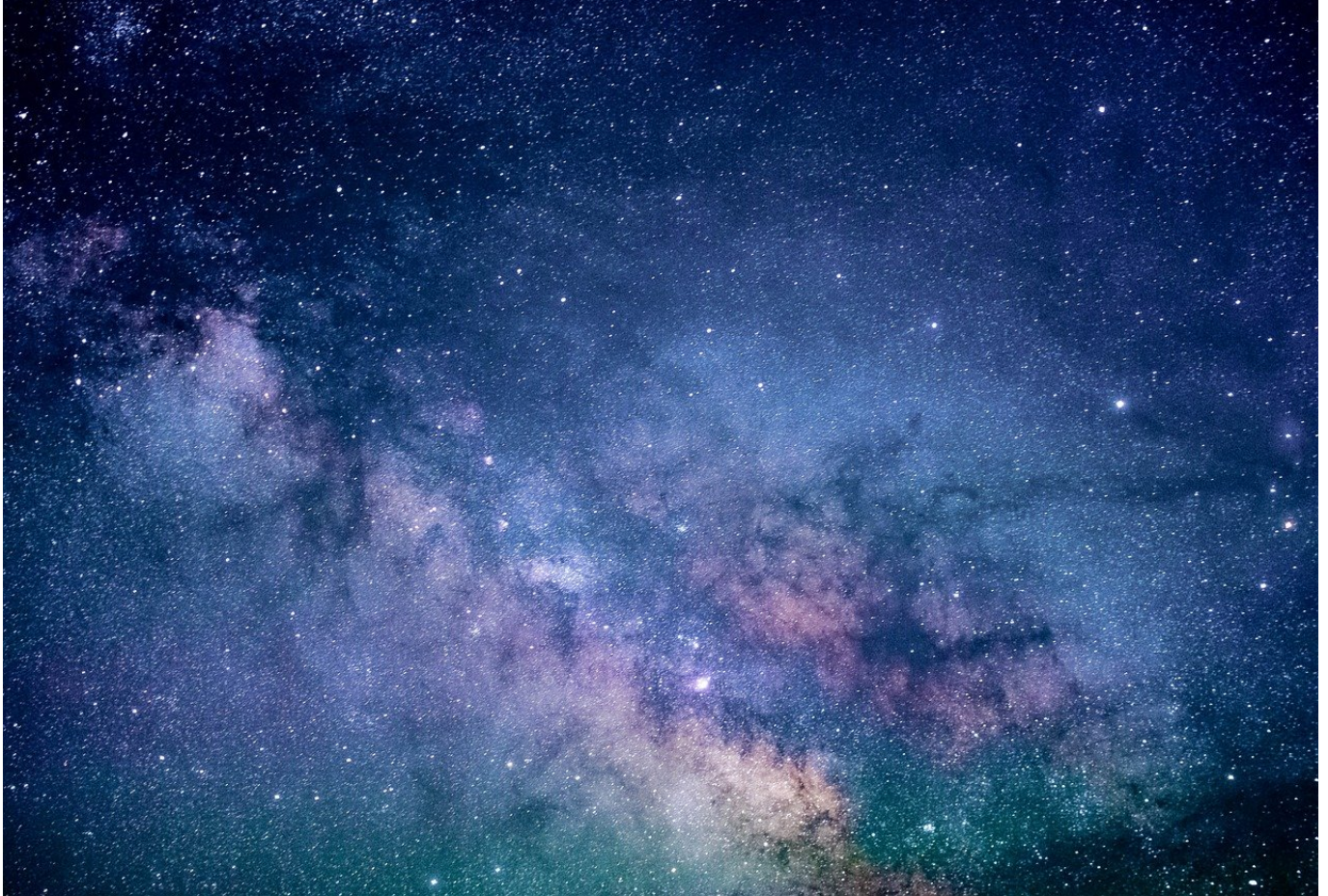
<b>dart</b>	Move along rapidly and lightly skim or dart. <i>She <b>darted</b> across the street.</i>
<b>dash</b>	Run or travel somewhere in a great hurry. <i>A gust of rain <b>dashed</b> against the bricks.</i>
<b>flash</b>	Run or move very quickly or hastily. <i>Lightning <b>flashed</b> overhead.</i>
<b>fly</b>	Cause to fly or float. <i><b>Fly</b> into a rage.</i>
<b>gallop</b>	Make a horse gallop. <i>Did you <b>gallop</b> the horse just now.</i>
<b>go hell for leather</b>	Progress by being changed.
<b>go like lightning</b>	Continue to live through hardship or adversity.
<b>hare</b>	Run quickly like a hare. <i>He <b>hared</b> off between the trees.</i>
<b>hasten</b>	Cause (something, especially something undesirable) to happen sooner than it otherwise would. <i>We <b>hastened</b> back to Paris.</i>
<b>hurry</b>	Act or move at high speed. <i><b>Hurry</b> up and finish your meal.</i>
<b>hurtle</b>	Make a thrusting forward movement. <i>A runaway car <b>hurtled</b> towards them.</i>
<b>race</b>	Prepare and enter an animal or vehicle for races. <i>Next year he <b>raced</b> again for the team.</i>
<b>rattle along</b>	Shake and cause to make a rattling noise.
<b>run</b>	Run as a sport or for exercise. <i><b>Run</b> a process.</i>
<b>rush</b>	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>I <b>rushed</b> outside and hailed a taxi.</i>
<b>scramble</b>	Cook (eggs) by beating them with a little liquid and then cooking and stirring them gently. <i>The Hurricanes were <b>scrambled</b> again this time meeting Italian fighters.</i>
<b>scud</b>	Run or move very quickly or hastily. <i>Three small ships were <b>scudding</b> before a brisk breeze.</i>
<b>scurry</b>	(of a person or small animal) move hurriedly with short quick steps. <i>Pedestrians <b>scurried</b> for cover.</i>

<b>scutter</b>	(especially of a small animal) move hurriedly with short steps. <i>A little dog <b>scattered</b> up from the cabin.</i>
<b>shoot</b>	Of a bud or shoot appear sprout. <i>The troops were ordered to <b>shoot</b> to kill.</i>
<b>soar</b>	Fly by means of a hang glider. <i>When she heard his voice her spirits <b>soared</b>.</i>
<b>soar up</b>	Go or move upward.
<b>soar upwards</b>	Rise rapidly.
<b>spank along</b>	Give a spanking to; subject to a spanking.
<b>speed</b>	Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit. <i>The car that crashed was <b>speeding</b>.</i>
<b>sprint</b>	Run at full speed over a short distance. <i>I saw Charlie <b>sprinting</b> through the traffic towards me.</i>
<b>stampede</b>	Run away in a stampede. <i>Thunderbolts can <b>stampede</b> animals.</i>
<b>streak</b>	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>The plane <b>streaked</b> across the sky.</i>
<b>surge</b>	Rise and move, as in waves or billows. <i>The journalists <b>surged</b> forward.</i>
<b>sweep</b>	Sweep across or over. <i>They were trying to get the Lewis gun up behind some trees from where they would <b>sweep</b> the trench.</i>
<b>swoop</b>	Move with a sweep or in a swooping arc. <i>She <b>swooped</b> up the hen in her arms.</i>
<b>whirl</b>	Move or cause to move rapidly. <i>A kaleidoscope of images <b>whirled</b> through her brain.</i>
<b>whizz</b>	Move quickly through the air with a whistling or buzzing sound. <i><b>Whizz</b> the mixture to a smooth paste.</i>
<b>whizz along</b>	Make a soft swishing sound.
<b>whoosh</b>	Move with a whooshing sound. <i>Oil <b>whooshed</b> up when the drill hit the well.</i>
<b>wing</b>	Travel on wings or by aircraft fly. <i>A little preparation puts you ahead of the job seekers who try to <b>wing</b> it.</i>
<b>zoom along</b>	Move with a low humming noise.

<b>ascend</b>	Travel up. <i>Jupiter <b>ascends</b>.</i>
<b>ascent</b>	The act of changing location in an upward direction. <i>The <b>ascent</b> grew steeper.</i>
<b>augmentation</b>	The lengthening of the time values of notes in a melodic part. <i>The <b>augmentation</b> of the curriculum with new subjects.</i>

<b>escalate</b>	Increase rapidly. <i>The disturbance <b>escalated</b> into a full scale riot.</i>
<b>fast</b>	(of a film) needing only a short exposure. <i>Set a <b>fast</b> pace.</i>
<b>increase</b>	A change resulting in an increase. <i>We are aiming to <b>increase</b> awareness of social issues.</i>
<b>ladder</b>	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>One of Sally s stockings developed a <b>ladder</b>.</i>
<b>mounting</b>	The action of mounting something. <i>The <b>mounting</b> of rapid fire guns.</i>
<b>precipitate</b>	A precipitated solid substance in suspension or after settling or filtering. <i>Cell proteins were then <b>precipitated</b> and washed in 10 trichloroacetic acid.</i>
<b>proliferate</b>	Increase rapidly in number; multiply. <i>Pizza parlors <b>proliferate</b> in this area.</i>
<b>promote</b>	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>I got <b>promoted</b> after many years of hard work.</i>
<b>raise</b>	Raise from a lower to a higher position. <i><b>Raise</b> a mutiny.</i>
<b>rise</b>	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>Christ is <b>risen</b>.</i>
<b>shin</b>	The inner and thicker of the two bones of the human leg between the knee and ankle. <i>He <b>shinned</b> up a tree.</i>
<b>soar</b>	The act of rising upward into the air. <i>The gulls <b>soared</b> on the summery winds.</i>
<b>spate</b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>A <b>spate</b> of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
<b>stepladder</b>	A folding portable ladder hinged at the top.
<b>surge</b>	Rise or move forward. <i>The boats <b>surged</b>.</i>
<b>up</b>	Lift something up. <i>Dot didn t hear Mrs Parvis come creeping <b>up</b> behind her.</i>

**upgrade** Raise (an employee) to a higher grade or rank.

**upsurge** A sudden forceful flow.  
*An **upsurge** of emotion.*

**volant** (of an animal) able to fly or glide.  
*A falcon **volant**.*

**whizz** A whistling or buzzing sound made by something moving fast through the air.  
*Cobbled streets where people **whizzed** back and forth on bicycles.*

**winged** Having wings or as if having wings of a specified kind.  
*The **winged** feet of Mercury.*
