- *Cause (a lens or camera) to zoom in or out.*
- *Rise rapidly.*
- *Move with a low humming noise.*
- *(of a camera or user) change smoothly from a long shot to a close-up or vice versa.*
- *Move or travel very quickly.*
- *(of a figure or level) rise sharply.*
- *Move along very quickly.*

blast	Kick or strike (a ball) hard. <i>Fierce techno riffs blasted out from the sound system.</i>
<u>bolt</u>	Make or roll into bolts. <i>All the doors were locked and bolted.</i>
bowl along	Hurl a cricket ball from one end of the pitch towards the batsman at the other end.
<u>buzz</u>	Signal to someone with a buzzer. <i>Mosquitoes were buzzing all around us.</i>
<u>career</u>	Move swiftly and in an uncontrolled way. <i>The coach careered across the road and went through a hedge.</i>
<u>charge</u>	Energize a battery by passing a current through it in the direction opposite to discharge. <i>The speaker charged up the crowd with his inflammatory remarks.</i>

dash	Run or travel somewhere in a great hurry. <i>A gust of rain dashed against the bricks.</i>
flash	Run or move very quickly or hastily. <i>Lightning flashed overhead.</i>
fly	Cause to fly or float. <i>Fly into a rage.</i>
gallop	Make a horse gallop. <i>Did you gallop the horse just now.</i>
go hell for leather	Progress by being changed.
go like lightning	Continue to live through hardship or adversity.
hare	Run quickly like a hare. <i>He hared off between the trees.</i>
hasten	Cause (something, especially something undesirable) to happen sooner than it otherwise would. <i>We hastened back to Paris.</i>
hurry	Act or move at high speed. <i>Hurry up and finish your meal.</i>
hurtle	Make a thrusting forward movement. <i>A runaway car hurtled towards them.</i>
race	Prepare and enter an animal or vehicle for races. <i>Next year he raced again for the team.</i>
rattle along	Shake and cause to make a rattling noise.
run	Run as a sport or for exercise. <i>Run a process.</i>
rush	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>I rushed outside and hailed a taxi.</i>
scramble	Cook (eggs) by beating them with a little liquid and then cooking and stirring them gently. <i>The Hurricanes were scrambled again this time meeting Italian fighters.</i>
scud	Run or move very quickly or hastily. <i>Three small ships were scudding before a brisk breeze.</i>
scurry	(of a person or small animal) move hurriedly with short quick steps. <i>Pedestrians scurried for cover.</i>

scutter	(especially of a small animal) move hurriedly with short steps. <i>A little dog scattered up from the cabin.</i>
shoot	Of a bud or shoot appear sprout. <i>The troops were ordered to shoot to kill.</i>
soar	Fly by means of a hang glider. <i>When she heard his voice her spirits soared.</i>
soar up	Go or move upward.
soar upwards	Rise rapidly.
spank along	Give a spanking to; subject to a spanking.
speed	Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit. <i>The car that crashed was speeding.</i>
sprint	Run at full speed over a short distance. <i>I saw Charlie sprinting through the traffic towards me.</i>
stampede	Run away in a stampede. <i>Thunderbolts can stampede animals.</i>
streak	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>The plane streaked across the sky.</i>
surge	Rise and move, as in waves or billows. <i>The journalists surged forward.</i>
sweep	Sweep across or over. <i>They were trying to get the Lewis gun up behind some trees from where they would sweep the trench.</i>
swoop	Move with a sweep or in a swooping arc. <i>She swooped up the hen in her arms.</i>
whirl	Move or cause to move rapidly. <i>A kaleidoscope of images whirled through her brain.</i>
whizz	Move quickly through the air with a whistling or buzzing sound. <i>Whizz the mixture to a smooth paste.</i>
whizz along	Make a soft swishing sound.
whoosh	Move with a whooshing sound. <i>Oil whooshed up when the drill hit the well.</i>
wing	Travel on wings or by aircraft fly. <i>A little preparation puts you ahead of the job seekers who try to wing it.</i>
zoom along	Move with a low humming noise.

<u>accelerate</u>	Cause to move faster. <i>The key question is whether stress accelerates ageing.</i>
ascend	Travel up. <i>Jupiter ascends.</i>
ascent	The act of changing location in an upward direction. <i>The ascent grew steeper.</i>
augmentation	The lengthening of the time values of notes in a melodic part. <i>The augmentation of the curriculum with new subjects.</i>
<u>climb</u>	A mountain hill or slope that is climbed. <i>The track climbed steeply up a narrow twisting valley.</i>

mounting	The action of mounting something. <i>The mounting of rapid fire guns.</i>
<u>precipitate</u>	A precipitated solid substance in suspension or after settling or filtering. <i>Cell proteins were then precipitated and washed in 10 trichloroacetic acid.</i>
proliferate	Increase rapidly in number; multiply. <i>Pizza parlors proliferate in this area.</i>
promote	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>I got promoted after many years of hard work.</i>
raise	Raise from a lower to a higher position. <i>Raise a mutiny.</i>
rise	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>Christ is risen.</i>
shin	The inner and thicker of the two bones of the human leg between the knee and ankle. <i>He shinned up a tree.</i>
<u>soar</u>	The act of rising upward into the air. <i>The gulls soared on the summery winds.</i>
spate	A large number or amount or extent. <i>A spate of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
stepladder	A folding portable ladder hinged at the top.
<u>surge</u>	Rise or move forward. <i>The boats surged.</i>
<u>up</u>	Lift something up. <i>Dot didn t hear Mrs Parvis come creeping up behind her.</i>

upgrade Raise (an employee) to a higher grade or rank.

upsurge A sudden forceful flow.
*An **upsurge** of emotion.*

volant (of an animal) able to fly or glide.
*A falcon **volant**.*

whizz A whistling or buzzing sound made by something moving fast through the air.
*Cobbled streets where people **whizzed** back and forth on bicycles.*

winged Having wings or as if having wings of a specified kind.
*The **winged** feet of Mercury.*
